- b. *COVID-19 Response*
 - i. During the Yellow Springs PRIDE festival on 06/25/2022 Medical Reserve Corps volunteers gave out 198 home test kits.

c. *Monkeypox*

- i. Mayo Clinic laboratories began using the orthopoxvirus test for monkeypox on 07/11/2022. Orthopoxvirus tests are used for non-smallpox orthopox viruses. Additional commercial laboratories will also be able to test soon.
- ii. After someone is infected with monkeypox there is an incubation period of roughly one to two weeks. The initial symptoms are fever, malaise, headache, and weakness. Persons infected will have fever then rash. The feature that distinguishes monkeypox from smallpox is the development of swollen lymph nodes in different parts of the body. Then lesions of the rash develop simultaneously on any part of the body. The rash goes through different stages (macular, papular, vesicular to pustular before scabbing over, and resolving) before healing completely. The illness lasts two to four weeks. Anyone with a rash that looks like monkeypox should talk to their healthcare provider about the need to get tested. Most cases that are occurring with this outbreak are associated with the less severe strain.

3. **Environmental Health**

a. *Food Establishment/Food Service*

- i. R. Schairbaum and A. Glascoe completed the second day of the ServSafe class on 06/28/2022. Thirteen students attended and there were two students retesting.
- ii. A Person in Charge (PIC) Certification course was taught by C. Propes and A. Glascoe for Crumbl Cookies on 07/11/2022, with a total of 46 students in attendance. To date, the health district has provided six PIC/Manager Certification food training courses with a total of 104 students in attendance, two student retests, and two proctored ServSafe exams.
- iii. The next ServSafe Manager Certification Course is scheduled for 10/17 and 10/24/2022.
- iv. The team performed inspections at the Xenia Red, White and Blue Block Party, Fairborn Block Party, Yellow Springs 4th of July, Beaver creek 4th of July, Governor DeWine's Ice Cream Social, and other events where temporary licenses were issued.

b. *Water*

- i. New permit tracking procedures have been implemented utilizing the Microsoft Tasks To Do program. This allows an environmental specialist to see at a glance where sewage and water permits are during the inspection and permitting process.

c. *Solid Waste*

- i. The solid waste hauling vehicle registrations have been processed. Vehicles are being inspected and plans have been made to schedule the inspections of vehicles from large companies to ensure that all the standards are met for these vehicles.
- ii. S. Adams and J. Gruza responded to a mercury spill at a home in Beaver creek. While moving in, the new homeowner accidentally broke an antique barometer a baby's crib, thereby contaminating the bedding and some toys. One of Ohio Environmental Protection Agency's Emergency Response agents met the health district on site and conducted testing to ensure the "hot" materials were removed and abatement was completed in a safe manner.

d. *Mosquito*

- i. The mosquito control program continues with new trapping locations being identified. The health district applied the first adulticide in known problem areas and neighborhoods on 06/29/2022. To date, 23 pools of mosquitos have been submitted for testing.

e. *Swimming Pools*

- i. The team has been busy with swimming pool/spa inspections. As of 06/30/2022, a total of 20221 standard inspections, 31 follow-up inspections, and 96 consultations have been completed by the team.

4. **Maternal Child Health**

a. *Early Intervention (EI)*

- i. The ability to offer service coordination services virtually has provided service opportunities in diverse family/agency situation such as divorce, and children services situations when the program is serving a child in foster care and birth parents are still involved and working on reunification. In a more recent case the ability to provide virtual service permitted a mother in rehab the opportunity to participate in the development of an Individual Family Service Plan along with the child's caregivers.

b. *Help Me Grow Early Childhood Home Visiting*

- i. A correction to last month's report: The Healthy Families America (HFA) program capacity is 50 and the program continues at capacity this reporting period.
- ii. The program continues to offer Kroger gift cards as part of Ohio Department of Health's (ODH) Quarterly Incentive Retention plan.
- iii. The implementation plan for the HFA program is to work up to 25 families per each nurse home visitor.
- iv. An expansion grant of \$57,600.00 will help fund defray the staffing costs.

c. *Baby Me and Tobacco Free*

- i. Six mothers and one partner are currently participating. One mother graduated during the past month.
