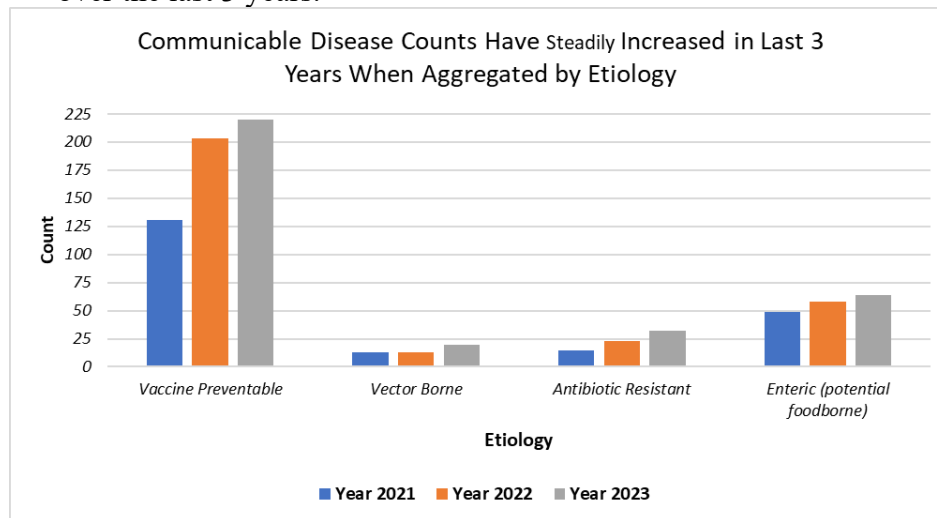
1. Foundational Capabilities

a. Administration

- i. Jeff Webb, Director of Environmental Health, is retiring on 01/31/24. Mr. Webb was recognized by the Board of Health for seven years of service to Greene County and 36 years of cumulative public health service. Mr. Webb shared his experience and knowledge with our community. He will be remembered for advancing technology used by the environmental health team. We wish him well. Shadrick Adams will serve as the Interim Director of Environmental Health.
- i. Health district offices will be closed 02/19/24 for President’s Day. We currently have one vacant position for a Home Visitor.

b. Epidemiology-

- i. Communicable disease counts when grouped by etiology have steadily increased over the last 3 years.



- ii. On 1/5/2024 an active investigation of Busseto brand Charcuterie Sampler and Fratelli Beretta brand Antipasto Gran Beretta was started due to illness with Salmonella. A food safety alert was issued. Ohio had a significant number of people infected but none have been reported in Greene County.

c. Governance

- i. Jane Clifton has been appointed as President of the Board of Health. Sylvia Ellison will serve as Vice-President. Orientation to the role was provided to Ms. Clifton by Health Commissioner Howell.

d. 2023 Causes of Death

- i. Heart disease is the leading cause of death in Greene County in 2023.

c. *Emergency Preparedness*

- i. Submitted Public Health Emergency Preparedness FY25 notice of intent to apply for funding 12/15/23; application due 01/22/24. The grant is flat funded for the next fiscal year. Activities will include reviewing all plans, training, and training employees to their expected role or position.

3. **Environmental Health**

a. *Food Establishment/Food Service*

- i. For 2023, General Services conducted ten food training courses (ServSafe and Person in Charge) for 171 attendees. We proctored three exam sessions (outside of the scheduled ServSafe courses) and five individuals retested for the ServSafe exam.
- ii. In 2023, Greene County Public Health issued 819 Risk Class I-IV food licenses, 25 vending location licenses, 52 food mobile licenses and 178 temporary food licenses. A total of 133 plans were submitted for review of new or remodeled food operations or mobiles.
- iii. On 01/07/24, R. Schairbaum and M. Glascoe met with board members and country representatives for the 2024 A World A 'Fair international festival at the Greene County Fairgrounds, occurring May 3-5, 2024.

b. *Body Art*

- i. Delinquent letters were mailed, or hand delivered to body art establishments that had yet to renew their license by 01/02/24. All delinquent body art establishments have now renewed their licenses for the 2024 licensure year.

c. *Sewage*

- i. Special Services is currently working through all the new 2024 registrations for sewage system installers, sewage system providers, and septage haulers.

d. *Private Water Systems*

- i. In cooperation with Greene County Engineer's office, Environmental Health staff responded to a complaint of illegal well sealing, leach bed destruction, and damage to an existing well at an industrial site in Spring Valley. Enforcement action is underway.

4. **Health Education**

a. *Healthy Eating Active Living*

- i. A Fairborn Community Survey was distributed to the residents of Fairborn to get their thoughts on their built environment. The survey was distributed from December 18, 2023, to January 15, 2024. Forty-seven residents responded to the survey questions.
- ii. The first Healthy Eating Active Living (HEAL) Fairborn Planning Committee meeting was 01/23/24 to discuss Fairborn's accessibility. At this meeting, residents

and partners were informed on the HEAL grant and provided with the results of the Community Survey.

- iii. Greene County Public Health is partnering with Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission (MVRPC) to educate Fairborn residents on conducting a walk audit on their community. In February, we will be asking the residents and partners of the Planning Committee to conduct a self-audit. The results of these walkability audits will help determine improvements or enhancements needed in the Fairborn community to increase residents' accessibility to healthy foods.
- b. *Safe Communities*
 - i. The Super Bowl campaign is underway! To help keep us all safe on the roads, National Highway Traffic Safety Association (NHTSA) is teaming up with Greene County Safe Communities to remind football enthusiasts that *Fans Don't Let Fans Drive Drunk!* Table tents will be provided to some local restaurants to encourage fans to plan for a sober ride home if they plan to consume alcohol.
 - ii. Yellow Springs High School and Cedar Cliff High School were offered the ThinkFast Program to come to their school. The ThinkFast Interactive Program would educate students on teen driver safety. Discussions with these schools are taking place to see if they can offer the program to their juniors and or seniors.
- c. *Harm Reduction*
 - i. The Implementing Overdose Response Strategies at the Local Level (IOPSL) grant funding ends January 31, 2024. This funding has allowed us to start our mobile SafeTrade unit, expand the NaloxBox distribution, collaborate with TCN Behavioral Health Services on the Quick Response Team, support conducting anti-stigma trainings for first responders, and overall improved and expanded our harm reduction programming.
 - ii. The funding from IOPSL has also allowed us to fund Overdose Detection Mapping Application Program (ODMAP) for 3 years in high priority jurisdictions in Greene County. This will provide us near real-time overdose surveillance data across jurisdictions of Greene County to support public health efforts to mobilize an immediate response to a sudden increase or spike in overdose events.
 - iii. January 24, 2024, will be the first of a series of naloxone trainings that will be provided for the members of the Xenia Area Chamber of Commerce.
 - iv. Recovery Plus is installing a NaloxBox.
 - v. Cold weather supplies are being donated to Miami Valley Community Action Partnership (MVCAP). Unhoused community members may receive supplies such as hand warmers, emergency blankets, socks, gloves, and naloxone. MVCAP is working to obtain an estimate for the number of unhoused individuals in the county.

The report is based on several factors from previous years including employees achieving 100% in the 45-day compliance audit, and positive parent survey responses indicating parents are receiving the services they need to help their child.
