GREENE COUNTY PUBLIC HEALTH MONTHLY ACTIVITY REPORT March 25, 2024

1. Foundational Capabilities

a. Accreditation

i. Public Health Accreditation, while not required nationally, is required of Ohio Health Districts. The health district is in the process of becoming reaccredited. Plans required by Accreditation can be found on the website. The Community Health Assessment is a collection of local health data. The Community Health Improvement Plan is a shared document setting health priorities for everyone to work together to achieve better health outcomes. The strategic plan is specific to Greene County Public Health.

b. Administration

- i. Legislative updates: <u>HB 258</u> would increase fines for repeatedly selling tobacco products to minors and apply public nuisance law to places where such sales occur.
- ii. Attorney General Dave Yost released the 2024 edition of the <u>Sunshine Laws</u> Manual.
- iii. The 2024 edition of the <u>County Health Rankings</u> has been released. The original ranking has been replaced with a colored spectrum line to show where a county lies. The report provides trends in the data and recommendations for improvement.

b. Emergency Preparedness

- i. Trust for America's Health released <u>Ready or Not 2024</u>: Protecting the Public's Health from Diseases, Disasters and Bioterrorism stating policymakers are not heeding the lessons of past emergencies. Funding cuts and health misinformation is putting decades of progress in public health preparedness at risk. Ohio ranks in the highest tier of performance.
- ii. The MRC Coordinator presented two posters at the National Preparedness Summit in Cleveland, Ohio on March 27th:
 - a. Medical Reserve Corps Volunteers' Interest and Skill Level Compared to Public Health Outcomes.

3. Environmental Health

- a. Food Establishment/Food Service
 - i. R. Schairbaum is working on updating the ServSafe manager certification and person-in-charge courses. The course and presentation material updates are required to reflect the 2022 Food Code. The updated materials will be ready for our first ServSafe course in April
 - ii. The General Services team, along with help from the Special Service team, completed all the requisite food inspections for the 2023 food licensure year. A total of 560 inspections were conducted by the Environmental Health (EH) team.
 - iii. Letters for food operations that are delinquent in renewing their 2024 food licenses were mailed on 03/08/24. These operations have until 04/01/24 to renew their food licenses. J. Moon has been doing an excellent job in processing all the food licensing issues.
 - iv. On 03/20/24, the entire EH team selected the various festivals that we will be inspecting for the 2024 calendar year.
- b. Campgrounds, RV Parks, and Swimming Pools/Spas
 - i. License renewal letters for the RV Camp program were mailed to operators on 03/08/24. License renewal letters for the Swimming Pool/Spa program were mailed to operators on 03/06/24.
- c. Plumbing
 - i. The Department of Commerce have posted <u>rule</u> changes open for public comment until 04/05/24.
- d. Rabies
 - i. The warmer weather seems to have brought a sharp up-tick in the number of dog bites recently. Bites are most common among dog walkers and pedestrians. Thirty-three bites were investigated in February.
- e. Sewage
 - i. Our first Water Pollution Control Loan Fund (WPCLF) was awarded to a family in Caesarscreek Township. We have entered the beginning stages of the soil evaluation and design review and hope to install a replacement system by mid-Spring.

4. Health Education

- a. Healthy Eating Active Living
 - i. Partners and residents are currently completing walk audits in the Fairborn community. There are three locations for these walk audits including the 5 Points/Plaza area, Funderburg Road, and Dayton Yellow Springs Road towards Kroger. Upon receipt of the audits, in collaboration with Miami Valley Regional Planning Commission (MVRPC) we will work to synthesize the data and information provided. This information will lead discussions at the next Healthy Eating Active Living (HEAL) Planning Committee meeting. Twenty-one walk audits have been completed on Funderburg Road and four walk audits have been completed on the streets/area surrounding 5 Points.





- ii. In conjunction with the MVRPC, a food access walking map is being developed to provide food resources/locations to residents in Fairborn. Information included on this map includes groceries, community meals, and food pantries. This map will be printed, and we are hoping to have it available digitally.
- b. Safe Communities
 - Each quarter, Safe Communities grantees are required to report local crash fatalities. As of March 19, 2024, there are zero fatalities to report in Greene County for the 2024 year (January-March).
 - ii. The Spring AAA Seat Belt Challenge, with local high schools, will be held April 15, 2024 May 1, 2024. The winner of the Fall Challenge was Bellbrook High School.
- c. Harm Reduction
 - i. We established Emerge Recovery & Trade Initiative as a secondary naloxone distribution site and will have quarterly naloxone trainings open to the public, along with monthly HIV/HCV/Syphilis testing for the clients.
 - ii. The addition of fentanyl test strips to our naloxone mail order program has been highly successful. In four weeks, the number of orders has increased by 70% compared to our monthly average. In total, 580 fentanyl test strips will be distributed, and all the orders for fentanyl test strips included Narcan.
 - iii. Harm Reduction Team members A. Romer and K. Day received their permanent counselor numbers for HIV counseling, testing and referral.
- d. Tobacco
 - i. We attended the Greene County FISH Pantry on February 28, 2024, and March 20, 2024. At these tabling events, clients were asked where they experienced secondhand smoke. Clients could place dots on various locations such as someone's house, car, an apartment building, or their workplace. One client was referred to the Ohio Quit Line at the February 28, 2024 tabling event.

4. Help Me Grow Home Visiting

- a. Healthy Families America (HFA)
 - i. We continue interviewing for a home visitor position. The Family Support Specialist/Family Resource Specialists (FSS/FRS) HFA teams are busy as they assumed the previous home visitor's caseload and are at capacity.
- b. *Nurse-Family Partnership (NFP)*
 - We remain at capacity for NFP with two full-time nurse home visitors and they are working extremely hard to help families improve their lives and the lives of their children. We applied for the Ohio Department of Children and Youth (DCY) expansion grant to add another Public Health Nurse to the program.
