The Children with Medical Handicaps (CMH) program is an Ohio Department of Health (ODH) program that is offered by Greene County Public Health. CMH connects families of children with special health care needs to a public health nurse (PHN) and a network of quality providers. The program works like a back-up insurance

plan and helps families obtain payment for the services their child needs.

CMH Reminders


- Your child must see their CMH managing physician at least ONCE a year to be eligible for CMH treatment renewal. If you do not recognize the managing physicians name on your letter of approval or your doctor has changed, contact your public health nurse (PHN) to update your information.
- To be able to use your CMH benefits, all services must be provided by CMH providers. Care from non-providers will result in you paying for those services.
- Renewal is not automatic.
 - CMH treatment renewal consists of a medical and financial application.
 - The medical renewal application is typically completed by the managing physician.
 - Your financial application should arrive in the mail two months before your letter of approval expires.
 - ♦ If your child is actively managed by Medicaid, your financial eligibility will automatically renew. You will NOT receive a financial application packet.
- Call your PHN if you do not receive your financial application or if you need assistance. We are always happy to help.
- Before turning 18 your child will be sent a release and consent to sign for continued services.
 - If unable to sign for themselves, the parent/guardian may sign with explanation.
 - Upon turning 19, the child must sign for themselves or submission of guardianship paperwork must be received.

- Review and update your child's immunizations as discussed with your pediatrician. With this, teach your kiddos the importance of good hand hygiene and how to perform thorough hand washing.
- **Promote healthy digital habits**, not only by limiting screen time, but by interacting with them during their screen time. See what they are watching; make sure it is appropriate.
- Read together everyday. Reading with your child has a significant impact on vocabulary and speech development. For older children, take turns reading, or listen to audio books together.

What is Ohio Parent to Parent?

Ohio P2P is a statewide matching program that matches parents, family members, or caregivers of a person with a disability or special healthcare need. Our program is unique because we match families with an experienced, trained, volunteer support parent.

Who are the Ohio P2P Staff?

Ohio P2P Staff are family members of people with disabilities/special healthcare needs. Ohio P2P staff help match families with similar experiences and backgrounds.

Who are Support Parents?

Support parents are further along in life with a loved one who has a disability or special healthcare need. Support parents are trained using our national P2P training program. Support parents will listen and support others by sharing their experiences in a positive way.

Who are Referred Parents?

Referred parents are any family members or caregivers who would like to connect with another person for support. Some families request a connection for support with: dealing with a new diagnosis, facing challenges your family is experiencing, navigating life, or learning how to handle transition to adulthood.
